1 Overview

In celebration of Her Majesty's Golden Jubilee in 2002, the Queen's Awards for Voluntary Service was established as part of the UK National Honours system. It is the highest honour that can be bestowed upon voluntary groups, and is equivalent in status to the MBE. As such, the Queen's Awards not only serve to provide recognition of volunteer groups, but also demonstrate the high respect in which volunteering is held. The winners are announced each year on 2 June (the anniversary of The Queen's Coronation).

This prestigious honour recognises the exceptional contributions made to local communities by groups voluntarily devoting their time for the benefit of others. Groups can be nominated by friends, family or members of the public (self-nomination is not permitted), and details of how to make a nomination can be found on the [Queen's Awards for Voluntary Service website](#).

A group of two or more people can be nominated if it is based in the UK, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man. The group has to have been volunteering for the benefit of people in the UK or overseas for at least three years, plus more than half its members must be volunteers who have the right of residence in the UK.

This short article highlights the organisations in the Lancashire-14 area that have received this award. A full list of the Lancashire-14 recipients is provided in table 1. The details of the names of the organisations, dates of awards and locations by local authority boundary from 2003 to 2013, were kindly provided by the office of the Lord-Lieutenant of Lancashire. 2 Award winners in the Lancashire-14 area

2.1 Award winners in the Lancashire-14 area, 2018

In 2018, there were six winners of the Queen's Awards for Voluntary Service in the Lancashire-12 area and two within the Blackburn with Darwen unitary authority area:

- **Accy Rockers.** Dedicated charitable efforts for the support and improvement of the community of Hyndburn and surrounding areas.
- **Brookhouse Development Group (Blackburn) CIC.** Providing support and services to achieve positive change for the people and their community.
- **Lostock Hall Juniors Football Club.** Providing opportunities for young people to learn life skills in a safe and enjoyable environment through sport.
- **Mawdesley Cricket Club.** Providing coaching and training wherever they can to bring sports and fellowship to and for all in their rural community.
- **One Voice Blackburn.** Aspiring to create an inclusive, cohesive and vibrant community through health, empowerment and leadership.
- **Preston and South Ribble (North) Street Pastors.** Strengthening community life by listening, caring, and helping those on our streets.

- **Red Rose Recovery Lancashire Limited (RRR).** Engaging volunteers in training and positive activities, improving the lives of our beneficiaries and local communities.
- **Wrightington Wigan and Leigh NHS Foundation Trust Volunteers.** Providing support for patients, their families and the public.

2.2 Award winners in the Lancashire-14 area, 2003 to 2018

The following table lists the 56 voluntary organisations in the Lancashire-14 area that have won this prestigious award between 2003 and 2018. This total is comprised of 47 winners in the Lancashire-12 area, five in the Blackburn with Darwen unitary authority area and four within the Blackpool unitary authority area. The list emphasises the wide variety of groups that specialise in care/health services, rescue work, activities and support for children and young people, plus environmental projects etc. A few of the organisations cover areas that extend outside the county boundary, but all have been identified as award winners from Lancashire. One recent winner provides aid to a remote area of Pakistan, while other winners generally benefit specific communities or the general population in their local area.

3 Description of the geographies used in this report.

The Lancashire-12 area is comprised of the 12 local authorities that fall within the Lancashire County Council administrative boundary. The Lancashire-14 area incorporates the two additional unitary authorities of [Blackburn with Darwen](#) and [Blackpool](#) and has the same geographic footprint as the [Lancashire Local Enterprise Partnership](#) (LEP) area.

The 12 local authorities within the LCC boundary are [Burnley Borough Council](#), [Chorley Borough Council](#), [Fylde Borough Council](#), [Hyndburn Borough Council](#), [Lancaster City Council](#), [Pendle Borough Council](#), [Preston City Council](#), [Ribble Valley Borough Council](#), [Rossendale Borough Council](#), [South Ribble Borough Council](#), [West Lancashire Borough Council](#) and [Wyre Borough Council](#).
