1 Overview

The Ministry of Justice publishes a range of annual statistics which concentrate on the flow of young people (aged 10-17) through the Youth Justice System in England and Wales. This article is a summary of the statistics for Lancashire-14.

2 Types of offences

Violence against the person is the most common offence for a young offender (28%), followed by other motoring offences (13%), other offences (12%) and sexual offences (9%).




Chart 1 Types of offences, year ending March 2021

Over the five year period from April 2016 to March 2021, there has been a significant reduction in the number of proven offences. Violence against the person reducing by -48%, criminal damage by -74% and motoring offences by -61%. However, there has been a significant increase in the number of sexual offences by 66%

3 Demographics

Youth offending teams work with 10 to 17 year olds. The largest group of those managed by YOTs in the Lancashire-14 area are in the oldest age group, 15-17 years (84.4%), compared with 82.3% in England and Wales as a whole.

The ethnic breakdown is slightly more biased towards white offenders. In the 2011 census, 86% of the Lancashire-14 area were white and 91% of offenders were white. In comparison, 68% of offenders in England and Wales as a whole were white.

4 Use of justice

Use of Justice is the number of young people receiving custodial sentences expressed as a rate per 1,000 of 10-17 year old population. The use of justice rate is lower in Lancashire than in the North West and England. In the Lancashire-14 area, 3% of numbers cautioned or sentenced received a custodial sentence, 17% a community sentence, 47% first tier¹ and 32% pre-court disposals.

5 Outcomes

A referral order is the most comment outcome for a young offender (32%), followed by a youth caution (18%) and a youth rehabilitation order (17%).




Chart 2: Percentage split of youth cautions or sentences, year ending March 2021
