Recap on testing

- PHE route for new first outbreak

- If all providers come through PHE route, we can support process with results, etc
- DHSC prioritise:
 - Care Homes with a new outbreak
 - Care homes over 50 beds
- Local Authority local knowledge:
 - Care homes with no outbreaks
 - Care homes who are reporting high risk issues



Recap on testing

- Many Care Homes should have received test kits by now or they are en route.
- LD/MH supported living / care homes can use this route if they are symptomatic
- Domically Care Service Users can also get tested via Public Health route if they are symptomatic
- We are working on pathways to share this information



DHSC Webinars re: whole home swab testing process

LSCFT swabbing for Learning Disabilities

- LSCFT are offering a COVID-19 home swabbing service to children and adults with a Learning Disability who would have difficulty accessing the Government drive thru swabbing centres or using a home swabbing kit
- Also able to swab people before they move into a new tenancy and they have been requested to have a swab before they move



LSCFT swabbing for Learning Disabilities

- Service users who are living with families that don't have paid support into the home and no transport to access one of the swabbing sites
- Service users who are living in support living tenancy/residential
 placements/residential children's homes and schools, who don't have
 their own vehicle and staff teams have no access to transport
- Services users who may live at home or supported living tenancy whose behaviour would impact on their ability to travel to one of the testing sites or who would require specialist LD support to engage with test
- Request for service user to have a swab before moving to new tenancy

ADULTS SOCIAL CARE INFECTION CONTROL FUND RINGFENCED GRANT 2020

- Primary purpose to support Adult Social Care providers with infection control
- Allocation £16,197,303 of which £12,619,000 (75%) to be allocated within 10 working days of receipt on 'per beds' basis.
- **Target** remaining 25% to care homes or domiciliary care and to support wider workforce resilience
- **Determination** paid in 2 instalments (May & July) contingent on
- 1) being used on infection control
 - 2) care home support plan submitted by local authority by 29 May
- **Grant conditions** completed capacity tracker, none of funding to used for any other than the specified infection control measures. Recovery or return of unspent allocation
- Reporting -2 returns (26 June & 30 September) certified by Chief Executive and Director of Adult Services
- Secretary of State may reduce spend or withhold grant payment or require repayment of the whole or any part of the grant monies paid.

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Funding for your Care Home

If you wish to work out how much your care home is due to receive, it is based on the following calculation:

- 12,619 care home beds in Lancashire in total
- £16,197,303 allocation for Lancashire from Government as part of the national Infection Control Fund
- Of which 75% is to be directly disbursed to care homes = £12,147,977
- £ 12,147,977 divided by 12,619 beds = £ 962- 67 per bed
- Two payments of 50%, each worth £481-34 per care home bed



Payment Arrangements

- The first instalment will equal 50% of the allocation to your organisation.
- The payment is expected to be made to your organisation by the 10th June 2020.
- The first instalment is being paid to your organisation on the proviso that you have submitted data for the Lancashire Capacity Tracker (or NECS: (the national tracker run by the NHS / CQC)) at least once since the Pandemic started, and that you remain committed to complete the Tracker on a regular basis from now on.
- Our current expectations are that this will be completed daily.



Payment Arrangements

- Please assure yourself that your own care home is completing the Tracker and confirm that in your email response to LCC (as detailed in the letter).
- It remains our firm advice to you as a care home provider to continue to complete the Lancashire Tracker (in response to phone calls or directly on-line) and the Council will then take responsibility for uploading those details onto NECS.



Payment Arrangements

- The remaining 50% of your grant allocation will be paid in July / early August 2020 and within 10 working days of the second tranche of the Grant having been received by the Council from Government.
- Payment will also be contingent on the first instalment having been used fully and solely for infection control measures and also your continued use of the Lancashire Tracker.



Measures to be Funded

- Annex C of the Grant document sets out what care homes <u>must</u> use this money for:
- Ensuring that staff who are isolating in line with government guidance receive their normal wages while doing so. At the time of issuing this grant determination this included staff with suspected symptoms of Covid 19 awaiting a test, or any staff member for a period following a positive test;
- Ensuring, so far as possible, that members of staff work in only one care home. This includes staff who work for one provider across several homes or staff that work on a part time basis for multiple employers and includes agency staff (the principle being that the fewer locations that members of staff work the better);
- Limiting or cohorting staff to individual groups of residents or floors/wings, including segregation of COVID-19 positive residents;



Measures to be Funded

- To support active recruitment of additional staff if they are needed to enable staff to
 work in only one care home or to work only with an assigned group of residents or
 only in specified areas of a care home, including by using and paying for staff who
 have chosen to temporarily return to practice, including those returning through the
 NHS returners programme. These staff can provide vital additional support to homes
 and underpin effective infection control while permanent staff are isolating or
 recovering from Covid-19;
- Steps to limit the use of public transport by members of staff. Where they do not have their own private vehicles this could include encouraging walking and cycling to and from work and supporting this with the provision of changing facilities and rooms and secure bike storage or use of local taxi firms;
- Providing accommodation for staff who proactively choose to stay separately from their families in order to limit social interaction outside work. This may be provision on site or in partnership with local hotels.

LCC Auxiliary Staffing

- Lancashire Temporary Staffing Agency Shadowing Placements (Care Homes) has been shared on the portal
- Currently only taking up residential providers on their offer of shadowing placements.
- Started a process which will lead to all individuals from the LTSA to be tested before starting their shadowing placement and will obviously only begin if they receive a negative result. Once individuals are within the home, they will fall under the home's testing regime.
- Added welfare checks every Tuesday to the daily call to those homes who currently
 have individuals shadowing or on assignment. This is for the home's benefit to
 provide an update on the individual and whether they're having any issues with them.
- Building up the workforce as much as possible. Due to the need for testing and some
 of the recent guidance on reducing the number of settings an individual is working in,
 there may be some delays and a reduction in flexibility of the LTSA but we're working
 on being as reactive and supportive as possible.



LCC Auxiliary Staffing

- 53 individuals who are ready for a shadowing placement are based in the areas shown in the table.
- If there are providers within or close to these areas who can provide shadowing placements, it would be a big help to the LTSA to process individuals to a point where they are able to be deployed as part of a home's rota. This will improve our ability to respond to homes which request temporary additional staffing resources.

• We are now contacting the vast majority of care homes and hon-residential

- We are now contacting the vast majority of care homes and hon-residential providers in Lancashire and Blackburn with Darwen daily
- Information used to offer support to care homes and non-residential providers where required
- Information used to inform the local area return (Infection Control Fund-next slide)
- We are continuing to upload Care Home information to the National Care Capacity Tracker (NECS) on your behalf so you do not need to do both tasks (unless requested not to)
- We are managing to achieve record levels of returns to the NECS (around 85%) daily, previously this was around 10%
- We are continuing to refine our information gathering process and systems to try and minimise the impact on you
- Thank you for your continued support the information you provide is vital in helping respond to the pandemic

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LCC Tracker - Access to the Infection Control Fund

- To gain this data and assurance:
- Requirement for data to be made available on the National Care Capacity Tracker (NECS)
- 13 Yes/No questions for providers to answer to inform a local area return based upon whether homes can implement actions and/or access support
- These questions have been added to our Care Capacity Tracker daily information calls
- We can upload your responses directly to the National Care Capacity Tracker (NECS)
 as part of our daily upload process
- So far we have collected responses from 404 Care Homes

Guidance

Coronavirus (COVID-19): provision of home care

Published 22 May 2020



Main Updates

- PHE acknowledge that not all of this information is new, but aims to be a helpful resource that brings together all guidance related to coronavirus and home care in one place.
- The guidance is now consistent throughout the document
- Covers domiciliary care, supported living and extra care housing for older people, younger disabled adults and children.



Includes;

PPE

- Getting the right PPE
- National Supply Disruption Response

Shielding and care groups

- How home carers can support the shielding of clinically extremely vulnerable people receiving home care during COVID-19
- Dividing people who receive care into care groups
- Reducing contacts for shielded and at-risk people
- Reducing contact between staff
- How home carers can manage people they are caring for safely



Hospital discharge and testing

- COVID-19 testing for home care workers and individuals receiving home care
- Testing for patients and discharge from hospital into the community
- Safely discharging into the community

Robopets

- Possibility that the robot pets might transmit the virus - little is known about how long the virus may survive on the robots' fur.
- The procedure for routine cleaning effective in dealing with bacteria, but no research has been carried out on viruses, in particular the SARS-CoV-2 virus.
- Take extra precautions with the robot animals alongside your other infection control procedures.



Isolation and Positive Results

 For residents in care homes the 14 day isolation period is based on the time since onset and the absence of symptoms. It is not based on having a negative test result.



Isolation and Positive Results

- After 14 days (from onset or from the date of the swab if they were asymptomatic), the resident can cease isolation, providing they are symptom free and have not had a high temperature for 48 hours.
- This applies even if they still test positive.



Isolation and Positive Results

 A repeat COVID-19 test to confirm that the infection has cleared after the 14-day period is not required.

 The same applies to staff – they can return after 7 days if they are symptom free and have not had a high temperature for 48 hours. This applies even if they still test positive.

PHE state:

 Individuals being persistently positive for weeks or even longer is well reported in the literature. Small studies have shown that viable virus is not detected on culture more than 9 days after symptom onset suggesting that these individuals are not shedding live virus. The detection of virus from the respiratory tract is highest around the time of symptom onset and gradually declines over time. Lancashire

PPE Update

- Launch of PPE Portal for small care providers and GPs
- Lancashire part of the initial roll out this week
- Care homes with 24 beds or fewer and home care agencies will receive an invitation email from DHSC to register for the portal
- Once registered providers will be able to place a weekly order for PPE
- One combined pack contains 100 IIR masks, 400 aprons, and 800 gloves (400 pairs)

PPE Update

- We will continue to support providers who are in need of PPE as the portal is rolled out
- Longer term aim is the portal will replace the County Council as the emergency mechanism for obtaining PPE
- Thank you for working with us and having a more planned approach for requesting PPE over recent weeks
- Majority of requests now received during working week days and you are forward planning days/week ahead
- Change to our contact arrangements

- We will keep this under review as the new PPE portal is rolled out and will notify you of any further changes and further detail we receive on the PPE portal
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PPE - Contract Management Update

- Members of the contract management team are commencing a piece of work to understand how effective providers usual PPE supply chains are, and whether it is felt that supply chains are becoming more reliable (in terms of the suppliers' ability to respond to provider needs/demands).
- This has commenced this week, and a small random sample of domiciliary, supported living, residential and public health service providers have been contacted.
- Should the results highlight a positive picture, we plan to increase the number of providers to be contacted to aid us in our understanding of the PPE supply chain.

PHE - Care Home Calls

- A national team on behalf of PHE is contacting care homes to follow up where the home has notified an outbreak.
- The Minister of State for Care wants a daily update on care home status, focussing on whether a care home is 'recovered' from a previously notified outbreak of COVID-19 (based on 28 days since onset of symptoms in the most recent case).
- To meet this requirement, a short-term programme to follow-up care homes to ascertain 'recovery' status has been established based on actively contacting homes that have notified HPTs of outbreaks more than 28 days ago. The team started calling NW care homes on 14th May.
- This is understood to be a short term measure with another reporting mechanism being developed.

Care Navigation: Request for Information

- Care Navigation want to obtain feedback from care homes about the hospital discharge process in their areas to inform discussions with Trusts locally
- E.g. issues re: sourcing beds (care home accepts, costs approved and then the SU destination changes)
- E.g. adverse discharges; Trusted Assessment does not match the person's needs upon admission as well no meds, open wounds etc

Public Health

- Decreased levels of domestic abuse are being reported during the Covid 19 emergency.
- Business as usual for DA services they are still taking referrals and available for support
- Information on how to access support for victims, friends and family is available and has been uploaded to the portal, and what to do in an emergency. This will include information on perpetrator programmes.



- Planning for the easing of lockdown across all PH services and contracts and the implications for delivery of those services
- Begun planning and assessing the impact of the test and contact tracing on service delivery
- Inspire Substance Misuse Service is continuing to take referrals for people with alcohol and substance misuse treatment needs
- Reduced the number of detoxifications taking place following government advice to reduce possible hospital admissions
- Needle exchange is available through 'click and collect' and via delivery
- MDTs are in place for homeless/rough sleeper cohort working at ICP level



Sexual health services – Blackpool Teaching HospitalsPostal testing (T₄) available for Lancashire residents via websited. This will be for both symptomatic testing and asymptomatic.
