






Weekly rate of Covid-19 cases per 100,000 population tested under pillar 1 and pillar 2 (Week ending 12 July)






Cumulative lab-confirmed cases up to 19 July, rate per 100,000




Daily pillar 1 and pillar 2 lab-confirmed cases to 19 July






Weekly deaths occurring up to 10 July, compared with the five-year weekly average
