## NTP English as an Additional Language Tuition Available for Lancashire Schools

EAL tuition is available for pupils from Key Stage 1 to Key Stage 4, with 70% of the cost subsidised through the National Tutoring Programme.

The Ethnic Minority Gypsy Roma Traveller Achievement Service has a long history of supporting EAL pupils in schools to develop their English Language proficiency; to complement this service, for the second consecutive year we have successfully secured NTP tuition partner status. This means schools can access 15-hour packages of tutoring for pupils at a highly subsidised rate.

Last year, across Lancashire, over 500 EAL pupils in primary schools, secondary schools and alternative provision received NTP tuition from our team, despite disruption from school closures to the wider pupil population. Over the 15 hours' of tuition, these pupils made on average 1.06 NASSEA levels

progress in their English language development with pupils *New to English* through to *Competent* (i.e. typically in their first 5 years of learning English) making good levels of progress in all language areas.

NTP EAL tuition is:
1) For Year 1 to year 11
2) Focused on language development to support access to the curriculum
3) Largely taking place in a 1 tutor to 3 pupils ratio (although 1:2 or 1:1 tutoring is available in exceptional circumstances)
4) Focusing on Pupil Premium pupils with 2 out of 3 pupils required to be Pupil Premium.

## **Holocaust Memorial Day 2022**

Every year on January 27<sup>th</sup> we remember the victims of genocides throughout history and across the world. For many of us we think about the actions of the Nazis during the Second World War, but Holocaust Memorial Day also asks us to remember the victims of other genocides including but not limited to Cambodia (1975 – 1979) Rwanda (1994) Bosnia (1995) and Darfur (2003 – present)

Every year the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust devise a theme for the day, and they always come up with excellent themes. This year is no exception, with the theme being "**One Day**". This is a great topic for teachers in both primary and secondary settings allowing you to explore ideas such as:

*changed*" where an older the Diary of Anne Frank and when life changed for Anne for better or for worse.



Lancashire Day 27th November 2021

Lancashire Day is celebrated every year on the 27<sup>th</sup> November, this day is growing in popularity with schools across out County recognising the history of our wonderful county.

This day is to commemorate the day in 1295 when Lancashire first sent representation to Parliament, to attend the Model of Parliament. The day was first celebrated in 1996.

- Jelly Babies were invented in Lancashire

- The row of red public phone boxes along Preston's Market Street is the longest continuous retro of old-style ones anywhere in the country.


#### **ONLINE STUDY CENTRES**

Lit in Colour is a research project commissioned by the Runnymede Trust, begun in September 2020 and set up to discover the extent to which aspects of school are reflective of the diversity of modern English society.

Its findings, published in June 2021, make for interesting reading. They show that, although 34.4% school students in England were of other than White British ethnicity, fewer than 1% of GCSE English Literature candidates answered a question on a novel written by an author of colour.

Among other significant findings were that, while 70% of pupils surveyed (and 77% of BAME pupils) agreed that diversity is part of British society, three quarters of all respondents had never been taught by a BAME teacher. The subject of English literature appears, from the results, to have even lower representation of BAME teachers than other school subjects.

The report concludes with some recommendations for research and data, school leaders, teachers, parents, resource producers, teacher educators and CPD providers. Among these are the recommendation that schools seek to diversify the curriculum in terms of planning time, investment in diverse literature, and communication with parents; and that teachers begin with an audit of existing literature in their classrooms, aiming to broaden its extent and variety (as often BAME literature appears largely confined to poetry and extracts rather than novels), as well as mediating and building upon texts to develop a fuller understanding around its issues (for example, in pre-1900 texts with context of race and empire).

#### What has been the impact of school closures on EAL pupils?

Ongoing research from Durham University has been monitoring the impact of school closures on EAL pupils, who will of course have been further affected by the long summer holiday after a year of disruptions in their education.



Their research comprises case studies, school achievement analyses at GCSE and KS2, and surveys of pupils, parents, teachers and school

leaders. Their most recent bulletin noted the double disadvantage suffered by EAL pupils in terms of both subject and language learning loss during periods of school closure and/or remote learning. Critical in this regard were the following five factors:

- Reduced support in English Language Proficiency development;
- Unavailability of small group and/or one-to-one lessons;
- Less/no access to technology to support learning;
- Limitations of English language input from parents/family;
- Absence of government support aimed at meeting the needs of EAL pupils during this time.

We offer training, consultancy, and EAL tutoring at subsidised rates (see page 2), all of which can help your school address these issues and help you to support your vulnerable EAL pupils in making optimal progress post-closures.

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#### **Prevent Update**

The Lancashire Prevent team have recommenced their 90 minute online Prevent webinars for Education staff across Lancashire. The webinar features the Prevent duty, current risks and ideologies, emerging trends and safeguarding and vulnerability. The link to sign up is <u>here</u>.

The Prevent team can commission external project providers to deliver a range of sessions for staff and students. The dynamic process of project commissioning means that we will have several projects on offer over the course of the fiscal year. Currently we have the following on offer:

**Contextual safeguarding**: An interactive online training session to up-skill staff in contextual safeguarding, addressing extremism, violence and exploitation. The session will also provide an update on extremism and serious youth violence in their local area and provide tools with which to practically implement contextual safeguarding principles. **Cyber choices**: an opportunity to take apart in one of the Cyber Choices CPD sessions we have on offer for frontline professionals. Cyber Choices is a national programme co-ordinated by the National Crime Agency and delivered by Cyber Choices teams within Regional Organised Crime Units and Local Police Force Cyber Teams. The main theme of the session will be to look at safeguarding young people and vulnerable adults from being exploited into committing cybercrime. Sign-up link is <u>here</u>.


