# What is a **verb**?

A **verb** is a 'doing' word.

It is something you do.

**Clap, jump, hop** are all **verbs**.

Can you **think** of any more?

# What is an **adverb**?

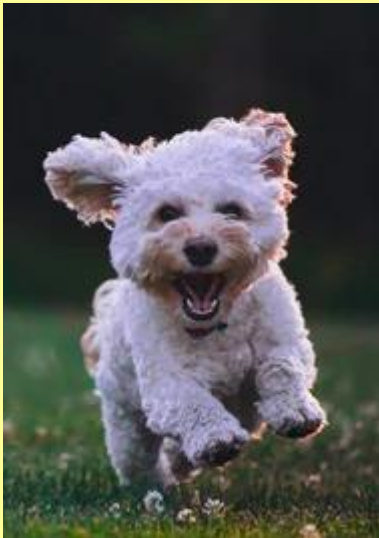
An **adverb** tells you how, when or where you do something.

It 'adds' to the **verb**.

This PowerPoint will teach you about 'how' adverbs.

# What is an **adverb**?

Most 'how' adverbs end in -ly.  
We put -ly on the end of an adjective.



The puppy is playful.  
The puppy runs playfully.

# Watch out!



Adjectives that end in 'y' change!

The puppy is happy.



happy~~y~~ → happ + i + ly → happily

The puppy runs happily.

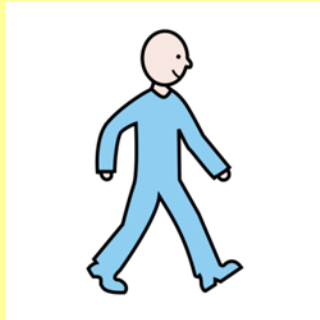
# Why use adverbs?

They make writing and speech more interesting.

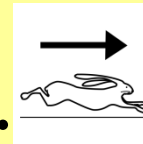
They give us more information about what is happening.

He walks.

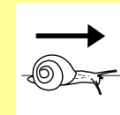
How?



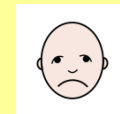
He walks quickly.



He walks slowly.



He walks sadly.



# Why use adverbs?

They can change the meaning of your sentence.



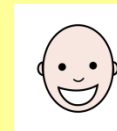
He shouts .

How?

He shouts loudly.

He shouts sadly.

He shouts happily.

quietly

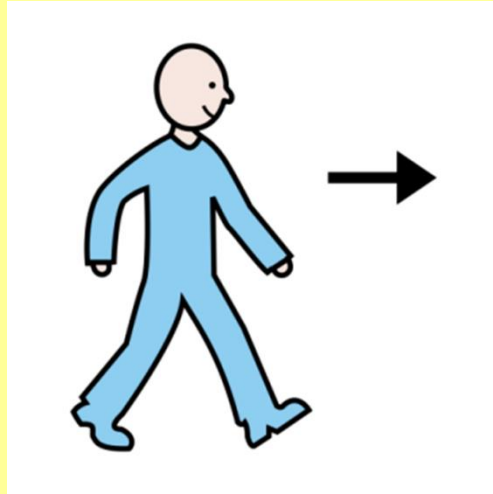
slowly

He sits happily.

carefully  
slowly  
quickly

He goes carefully.

stands

silently  
quietly  
bravely

The meerkat stands bravely .

eats  
hungrily  
slowly  
quickly

The girl eats hungrily.

drinks

thirstily  
noisily  
quickly

The boy drinks thirstily.

The boy throws the ball playfully.

happily

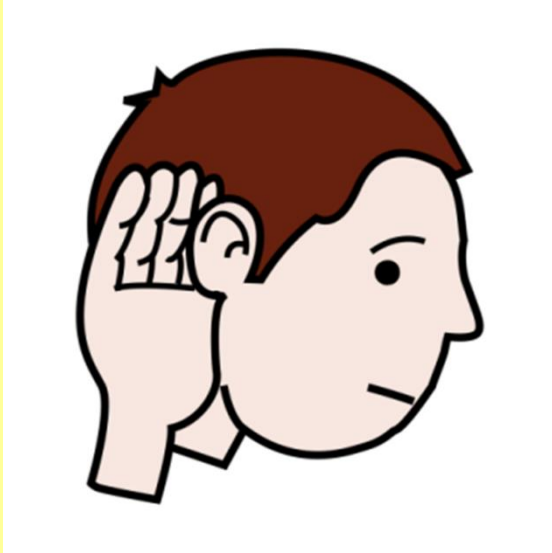
fast

# Adverbs



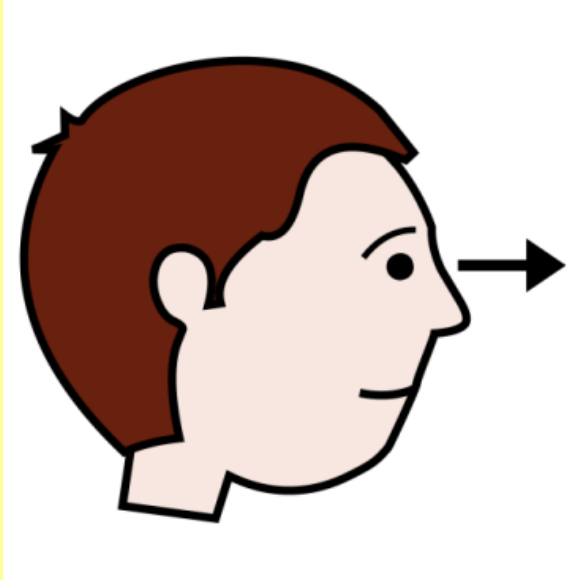
listens

He stamps angrily.

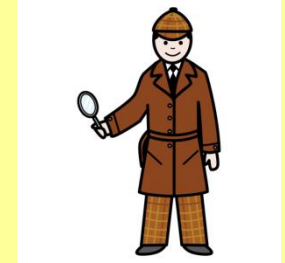

Good work if you did!



fast

✓ We say: I read well.

✓ We say: I run fast.

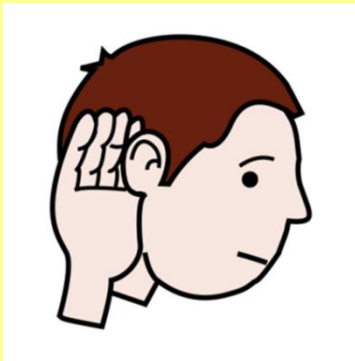
X We don't say: I read goodly.

X We don't say: I read good.

X We don't say: I run fastly.

# Adverbs can change places!

Adverbs don't have to go at the end when we write.



He listens **carefully**.

**Carefully**, he listens.

We put a comma after it

Look back at the sentences. Put the adverb at the start.

Usually, 'well' and 'fast' don't go at the start.
