

Who were the Victorians?






'The Victorians' are people who lived in the United Kingdom when a queen called 'Queen Victoria' ruled.

Queen Victoria ruled for many years and lots of people liked her.





This is a picture of Queen Victoria as a young woman.






Queen Victoria became queen in 1837 and ruled for 64 years.


During these years, Britain, and the other countries in the UK, changed a lot.



This is called a timeline.








Queen Victoria was the queen of a lot of countries, including Canada, parts of India and Australia.

These pictures will give you some clues about what life was like during Victorian times.




























What was everyday life like in Victorian times?

Some Victorians were very **poor** and some were very **rich**.

Poor Victorians worked in factories and mills. Some worked as servants for rich people. Children from poor families also had to work.

Some Victorians were so poor that they lived in a workhouse. A workhouse was not a nice place to live.



This is what a servant in a rich Victorian house might have looked like.



Some Victorians lived in the countryside and were farmers.








This is a painting from Victorian Times.


Belper Mill in Derbyshire - A cotton mill in Victorian times.

These are machines that were in cotton mills. Children from poor families would work with these machines.



Hats and bonnets were popular.






Women often wore their hair up.

Some men's coats had a cape on them.




The Victorians liked to read.




The Victorians enjoyed visiting the seaside.

The Victorians liked to walk on the pier and breathe the fresh sea air.








The Victorians liked to ride on donkeys and play in the sand - like we do!

The Victorians liked to watch a puppet show called 'Punch and Judy'.




What did the Victorians like to eat?







Victorians bought their food from high street shops.











Poor Victorians did not eat a lot. They would have old vegetables and meat if they could afford it.

These foods were popular: cheese, eggs, bread, bacon, mutton (older sheep meat), pork, beef, potatoes, rice, oatmeal, milk, vegetables, flour, sugar, treacle, jam and tea.



Did Victorian children go to school?



At the beginning of Victorian times, poor children had to work and did not go to school.


Rich children were taught at home by a special teacher called a 'governess'.


Later, special rules were made so that most children could go to school.

This is what a Victorian classroom might have looked like.










Here are some objects that you might have seen in an Victorian classroom...



The teacher would write on a large blackboard at the front of the classroom.




Paper was very expensive so children wrote on slates with a special slate pencil.





Older children used ink pens. They had to dip their pen in the ink a lot or it would run out.







An abacus was used to help children in Maths lessons.




What were Victorian houses like?

Wealthy Victorians




Hutton Hall, North Yorkshire. Built in 1866.

Early Victorians travelled in horsedrawn carriages.




This is a penny farthing.

It is a bicycle invented in Victorian times.










Cars were first invented during Victorian times.








During Victorian times, people also travelled by steam train.
