


Log Activities

- Can you pretend the floor has crocodiles/sharks on and see if you can cross the logs? Can you transport a stick across the logs and see how many you can collect?
- Can you balance across one log?
- Which log is the longest? Which log is the shortest?
- Which log has the widest gap? Which logs have the narrowest gap?
- How many posts (support posts) can you spot? What shape are they?
- Can you stride across the logs without stepping on them?
- Can you pretend they are horses and ride them to different places? What do you need to take with you? Can you make yourself a bag to carry? Can you find a stone/stick to pretend is a drink? Can you find a stick to use as reins?
- Can you make a bridge for the bugs/animals to cross the logs?
- Can you make a shelter for the animals to use in case it rains?

- Can you climb up the logs to the top without touching the soil?
- Can you walk along the logs balancing?
- Can you put on a 'show' for your family to watch? Can you sing a song?
- Can you time yourself to see how long it takes to run down the pathway?
- Can you play tig across the pathway so you are safe on the logs?
- Can you count how many logs are on each side?
- Can you create a bark rubbing using a leaf and some paper?
- Can you count how many leaps it takes to get from one end of the path to the other?
- Can you create a trail for a family member/friend to follow around the park?
- Can you play hide and seek?
- Can you play a game where one person has their eyes covered and has to listen to the instructions of the other to make it across?
- Can you create a path across the 'pathway' using natural materials?
