ADMISSIONS POLICY FOR SEPTEMBER 2024 TO AUGUST 2025

INTRODUCTION

St Augustine's is a Catholic Primary School provided by the Diocese of Lancaster and maintained by the Mater Ecclesiae Multi Academy Trust. The admissions process is part of the Local Authority Co-ordinated Admissions Scheme.

The Local Governing Body is the admissions authority and is responsible for taking decisions on applicants for admission.

The Governors welcome applications from Catholic and non-Catholic parents who would like their children educated within the aims and ethos of St Augustine's Catholic School.

Saint Augustine's is a Catholic Primary School in which the Catholic faith and the teachings of the Catholic Church are essential aspects of school life and influence the school curriculum.

We ask all parents applying for a place here to respect this ethos and its importance to the school community. This does not affect the right of parents who are not of the faith of this school to apply for and be considered for a place here.

The Governing Body is responsible for admissions within the requirements of the law. In doing so, the Governing Body has regard for:

- The Advice of the Diocesan Trustees on the nature and purpose of Catholic Schools. a.
- The Governing Body's responsibility towards the school and the Catholic community it serves. b.
- The Catholic character of the school and its Mission Statement.

The Governing Body Admissions Committee is comprised of three Governors and the Headteacher.

It is the duty of the Governors to comply with class size limits at Key Stage One. This means that the school cannot operate classes in Key Stage One of more than 30 children. No more than 30 children will be admitted to any one reception or infant class.

The Governing Body has set the planned admissions number for September 2024 at 38. The Local Authority and other parties required by law have been consulted on this.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR ADMISSION IN SEPTEMBER 2024

- Applications for a place at the school should be made using the online system via 1. www.lancashire.gov.uk/schools then 'Apply for a school place'.
- 2. Parents who wish their application to this Catholic school to be considered against the priority faith criteria should also complete the enclosed Supplementary Information Form. If the school is oversubscribed, failure to complete the Supplementary Information Form may result in your application for a place in this school being considered against lower priority criteria, as the Governing Body will have no information upon which to assess the application on the basis of the applicant's baptism.

The school's Supplementary Information Form should be returned to the school by the date specified by the local authority (January 15th 2024).

- 3. Each Catholic applicant will be required to produce a baptismal certificate or other evidence of baptism.
- 4. The admissions committee of the Governing Body will consider all applications at the same time after the given closing date of January 15th 2024.

- 5. Parents or guardians will be informed of the outcome of their application in writing by the date specified by the Local Authority.
- 6. As required by law, all children with a Statement of Special Educational Needs or Educational Health and Care Plan naming the school will be admitted before the application of the oversubscription criteria.

OVERSUBSCRIPTION CRITERIA

The Governors will admit up to 38 children in September 2024. If the number of applications for admission exceeds the places available, children will be admitted subject to the following criteria which will be used to form a priority order.

- Looked after children or a child who was previously looked after, but immediately after being looked
 after became subject to an adoption, child arrangement order, or special guardianship order or those
 children who appear to the school to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in
 state care as a result of being adopted.
- 2. Baptised Catholic children who live in the parishes of Saint John XXIII and St Wilfrid's with a sibling in the school at the time of expected admission.
- 3. Baptised Catholic children resident in the parishes of Saint John XXIII and St Wilfrid's.
- 4. Other Baptised Catholic children with a sibling in the school at the time of expected admission.
- 5. Other Baptised Catholic children.
- 6. Other children with a sibling in school at the time of expected admission.
- 7. Children with exceptional educational or welfare needs which are relevant to the school and whose application is supported in writing by an appropriate professional e.g. doctor or social worker.
- 8. Children who, or whose parents, are members of other faith communities and whose application is supported in writing by the appropriate minister of religion.
- 9. Other children.

In the event of oversubscription in any of the above criteria places will be allocated according to the following tie breaker criterion:

Applicants living nearest to the school. The distance measure is a straight line (radial) measure from the centre of the building that is the applicant's home address to the centre of school building. Distances are measured using the Councils' Geographic Information System.

If the Governing Body is unable to distinguish between applicants in any of the oversubscription criteria using this distance tie breaker (e.g. applicants in the same block of flats) places will be offered via a random draw.

NON ROUTINE OR 'IN YEAR' ADMISSIONS

In-year admission is the process of applying for a school place during the school year. Any applications for the intake made after the start of the autumn term will be treated as an in-year application. The in-year admission process is managed by the school. Parents are required to complete the in-year application form, which is available from the school website.

Where a place cannot be secured, parents will be offered a legal right of appeal to an independent appeal panel. The school/academy is responsible for the administration of the appeals process. The appeal form is available from the school website: www.staugustinespreston.co.uk

Parents who wish their application to this Catholic school to be considered against the priority faith criteria should also complete the school's *(enclosed)* Supplementary Information Form and return it directly to the school. If the school is

oversubscribed with in year admissions at the time of requested admission, failure to complete the Supplementary Information Form may result in your application for a place in this school being considered against lower priority criteria.

The admission of all students to Saint Augustine's Catholic Primary School will be co-ordinated by the Lancashire Local Authority Pupil Access Department, in line with recent changes in legislation.

DEFFERRED ADMISSION

If your child is due to start school during the next academic year, it is important that you apply for a place for September. If your child's fifth birthday is between the months of September and December, then, if you wish it, admission may be deferred until January; if it is between January and April, then admission may be deferred until the start of the summer term though it is likely to be in your child's interest to start no later than January.

PART-TIME ATTENDANCE

Parents can request that their child attends part-time until the child reaches compulsory school age.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Baptised Catholic

Please note this is not a change in our admission policy, it is a definition for the purpose of clarification. For admission to this Catholic school a baptised Catholic is

- One who has been baptised into full communion with the Roman Catholic Church by the Rites of Baptism of one of the various ritual Churches in communion with the See of Rome (Proof of baptism with a copy of a baptismal certificate or details of the date and place of baptism will be required)
- A child, baptised in another Christian Faith who has been received into full communion with the Roman Catholic faith. (Proof of baptism and reception from the Register of Receptions or Baptismal Register will be required)
- A child who, with his or her family, is enrolled in a recognised course of preparation leading to Catholic baptism (Proof of enrolment with details of the place and date of enrolment from the appropriate parish records will be required).
- One who is a member of the Eastern Christian Churches and the Orthodox Churches. (Proof of baptism with a copy of a baptismal certificate, details of the date and place of baptism or certificate of reception will be required).

Looked After Child

A 'looked after child' has the same meaning as in section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989, and means any child who is (a) in the care of a local authority or (b) being provided with accommodation by them in the exercise of their social services functions (e.g. children with foster parents) at the time of making application to the school. Looked after children or a child who was previously looked after, but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangement order, or special guardianship order or those children who appear to the school to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.

Siblings

Sibling refers to full brothers or sisters, half brothers or sisters, adopted brothers or sisters, or the child of the parent/carer's partner where the child for whom the place is sought is living in the same family unit at the same address as that sibling. Stepchildren or foster children who live at the same address are also classed as siblings

Address of Pupil

The address used on the school's admission form must be the current one at the time of application. If the address changes subsequently, the parents should notify the school. In some cases, for example, where shared parental living arrangements are in place, a child's address may be difficult to determine. In these circumstances, the address used for child benefit purposes, ie, the address of the parent claiming the child benefit, will be used.

If you are moving house and applying for the school and it is not oversubscribed, using your new address may not be a problem. In the event of oversubscription it may be possible to consider your application on the basis of an address you are intending to move to. You must be resident at a specific address and not just have a stated intention to move to an area. You must provide evidence that you have exchanged contracts on a house or have an offer of a tenancy on a property in which you intend to live and which will be in place when your child would start at the school. This evidence must be submitted as soon as possible and no later than

the Lancashire Authority deadline. Further evidence, eg utility bills, may also need to be submitted by the Lancashire Authority deadline.

Multiple Births

Where there are twins or multiple birth children wanting admission and it is not possible to offer a place to all of the children concerned or there is only one single place left within the admission number, then the Governing Body will be allowed to exceed the statutory limit, where the 39^{tht} child is a twin or from multiple births.

Late Applications

Applications received after the closing date determined by the Lancashire Authority will be treated as late applications. Only in exceptional circumstances, and where appropriate evidence is provided, will applications received after the closing date (but before offers of places have been made) be considered alongside those received on time.

Waiting List

A waiting list for children who have not been offered a place will be kept and will be ranked according to the admissions/oversubscription criteria. Parents/guardians are invited to contact the school if they wish to be informed of their child's position on the waiting list. The waiting list will be closed at the end of the Autumn term.

Fraudulent Applications

Where the Governing Body discovers that a child has been awarded a place as a result of an intentionally misleading application from a parent, for example, where a false address has been provided, then the Governing Body is required to withdraw the offer of a place. The application will then be considered afresh and a right of appeal offered if a place is refused.

Appeal Arrangements

If an application for admission has been turned down by the governing body parents can appeal to an independent appeals panel. This appeal should be sent in writing to the clerk to the governors at the school within 14 days of notification of refusal. The date of notification will be considered to be 2 working days after posting by first class post of the refusal to offer a place. The parents must give their reasons for appealing in writing. The decision of the appeal panel is binding on the parents and on the governing body.

Admission of children outside their normal age range

Parents may seek a place for their child outside of their normal age group, for example, if the child is gifted and talented or has experienced problems such as ill health. In addition, the parents of a summer born child* may choose not to send that child to school until the September following their fifth birthday and may request that they are admitted out of their normal age group – to reception rather than year 1. The Governing Body will take decisions on any such requests on the circumstances of each case. This will include taking account of the parent's views, information about the child's academic, social and emotional development; where relevant, their medical history and the views of a medical professional; whether they have previously been educated out of their normal age group; and whether they may naturally have fallen into a lower age group if it were not for being born prematurely.

When informing a parent of their decision on the year group the child should be admitted to, the Governing Body will clearly state the reasons for their decision.

Where the Governing Body agrees to a parent's request for their child to be admitted out of their normal age group and, as a consequence of that decision, the child will be admitted to a relevant age group (i.e. the age group to which pupils are normally admitted to the school) the local authority and Governing Body must process the application as part of the main admissions round, unless the parental request is made too late for this to be possible, and on the basis of their determined admission arrangements only, including the application of oversubscription criteria where applicable. They must not give the application lower priority on the basis that the child is being admitted out of their normal age group. Parents have a statutory right to appeal against the refusal of a place at a school for which they have applied. This right does not apply if they are offered a place at the school but it is not in their preferred age group.

* The term summer born children relates to all children born from 1 April to 31 August. These children reach compulsory school age on 31 August following their fifth birthday (or on their fifth birthday if it falls on 31 August). It is likely that most requests for summer born children to be admitted out of their normal age group will come from parents of children born in the later summer months or those born prematurely.
