If not, your child is missing out on lots of fun, early learning and development benefits such as:

- improving children's speaking, language and listening skills
- preparing children to start school, by helping them to understand what is expected of them and gets them used to daily routines
- helping children to make new friends and builds their confidence
- encouraging children to be active and develop physically through fun and play both indoors and out

And if you qualify, it's paid for by the government, so shouldn't cost you anything to take your child along!

Perhaps Grandparents or other extended family members are caring for your child during the day?

That's no problem, family are the most important people in a child's early life and they can still be involved. A funded place offers up to 15 hours

per week (570 hours per year) but feel free to take your time. If you want to ease your child into early learning by taking up less than 15 hours per week to start with, you can. Most preschools, nurseries and childminders are flexible and can offer different times and hours to suit you. Doing this can help your child to 'settle in', help reduce any concerns you may have as a parent and ease the pressure on grandparents a little too!

Even if you are currently not working, don't let your child miss out, take up their place today!
