ST PATRICK'S ROMAN CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL **ADMISSIONS POLICY 2024/2025**

- 1.1 This Policy was written after due consideration of the School's Mission Statement and Core Values.
- 1.2 The Governing body of St Patrick's Roman Catholic Primary School applies the regulations on admissions fairly and equally to all those who wish to attend this school. The School Standards and Framework Act 1998 introduced a new framework for school admissions as of September 2001. This Policy conforms to the regulations that are set out in that Act and also further explained in the statutory School Admissions Code of Practice and the statutory Appeals Code of Practice.
- 1.3 The number of places available for admission to Reception is a maximum of 30. Last year the school was able to admit all pupils whose parents applied.

ADMISSIONS CRITERIA

- 2.1 We are an inclusive school that welcomes children from all backgrounds and abilities. All applications are treated on merit and in a sensitive manner. The level of ability of a child or any special needs that s/he may have plays no part in the admissions policy of this school.
- 2.2 In the event that there are more applicants than places, the Governing Body will allocate places using the following criteria.
 1. Baptised Roman Catholic children looked after by a Local Authority and adopted children who were previously looked after (including those children who appear to have been in care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.)
 2. Baptised Roman Catholic siblings (a full half or step brother or sister and fostered and adopted children residing at the same address) of children at the school who will still be on the school roll at the time of admission.
 3. Baptised Roman Catholic children from the Parish of **Blessed John Henry Newman**.
 4. Other Baptised Roman Catholic children.
 5. Other children looked after by a Local Authority and adopted children who were previously looked after (including those children who appear

- to have been in care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.)
6. Other siblings of children at the school who will still be on the school roll at the time of admission.
 7. Baptised children of other Christian denominations and world faiths.
 8. Other children.

If within any category there are more applicants than places available, priority will be given on the basis of proximity to the school measured by the walking distance along public highways between the front gate of the family home and the main entrance of the school.

In the event of a tied distance measurement between address points the Local Authority's system of a random draw will determine which address(es) receive the offer(s).

Please note this is not a change in our admission policy, it is a definition for the purpose of clarification. For admission to this Catholic school a baptised Catholic is

- One who has been baptised into full communion with the Roman Catholic Church by the Rites of Baptism of one of the various ritual Churches in communion with the See of Rome (Proof of baptism with a copy of a baptismal certificate or details of the date and place of baptism may be required).
- A child baptised in another Christian Faith who has been received into full communion with the Roman Catholic faith. (Proof of baptism and reception from the Register of Receptions or Baptismal Register may be required).
- A child who, with his or her family, is enrolled in a recognised course of preparation leading to Catholic baptism (Proof of enrolment with details of the place and date of enrolment from the appropriate parish records may be required).
- One who is a member of the Eastern Christian Churches and the Orthodox Churches. (Proof of baptism with a copy of a baptismal certificate, details of the date and place of baptism or certificate of reception may be required).

Siblings

Sibling refers to full brothers or sisters, half brothers or sisters, adopted brothers or sisters, or the child of the parent/carer's partner where the child for whom the place is sought is living in the same family unit at the same address as that sibling. Stepchildren or foster children who live at the same address are also classed as siblings.

Address of Pupil

The address used on the school's admission form must be the current one at the time of application. If the address changes subsequently, the parents should notify the school. In some cases, for example, where shared parental living arrangements are in place, a child's address may be difficult to determine. In these circumstances, the address used for child benefit purposes, i.e. the address of the parent claiming the child benefit will be used.

Multiple Births

Where there are twins, etc. wanting admission and there is only a single place left within the admission number, then the governing body will exercise as much flexibility as possible within the requirements of infant class sizes. In exceptional circumstances cases we are now able to offer places for both twins and all triplets, even when this means breaching infant class size limits. This may also apply to siblings who are in the same year group.

Making an application

Please refer to the online admissions system rather than the admissions booklet as the means to complete an application for pupils starting in Reception Class. The online admissions system can be accessed via www.lancashire.gov.uk/schools then search on the A-Z for 'schools admissions'. Once on the site, families can access the admissions information.

Applications received after the published closing date will be treated as late applications. Only in exceptional circumstances, and where appropriate evidence is provided, will applications received after the closing date (but before offers of places have been made) be considered alongside those received on time.

Waiting List

A waiting list for children who have not been offered a place will be kept and will be ranked according to the admissions/oversubscription criteria. Parents/guardians are invited to contact the school if they wish to be informed of their child's position on the waiting list. The waiting list will be closed at the end of the Autumn Term.

If your child is due to start school during the next academic year, it is important that you apply for a place for September. If your child's fifth birthday is between the months of September and December, then, if you wish it, admission may be deferred until January; if it is between January and April, then admission may be deferred until the start of the summer term though it is likely to be in your child's interest to start no later than January. You may also request that your child attend school part time until he/she reaches his/her fifth birthday.

Fraudulent Applications

Where the Governing Body discovers that a child has been awarded a place as a result of an intentionally misleading application from a parent, for example, where a false address has been provided, then the Governing Body is required to withdraw the offer of a place. The application will then be considered afresh and a right of appeal offered if a place is refused.

Appeal arrangements

If an application for admission has been turned down by the governing body parents can appeal to an independent appeals panel. This appeal should be sent in writing to the clerk to the governors at the school within 14 days of notification of refusal. The date of notification will be considered to be 2 working days after posting by first class post of the refusal to offer a place. The parents must give their reasons for appealing in writing. The decision of the appeal panel is binding on the parents and on the governing body.

Admission of children outside their normal age group

Parents may seek a place for their child outside of their normal age group, for example, if the child is gifted and talented or has experienced problems such as ill health. In addition, the parents of a summer born child (see explanatory notes) may choose not to send that child to school until the September following their fifth birthday and may request that they are admitted out of their normal age group – to reception rather than Year 1. Admission authorities **must** make clear in their admission arrangements the process for requesting admission out of the normal age group.

Decisions will be made on the basis of the circumstances of each case and in the best interests of the child concerned. This will include taking account of the parent's views; information about the child's academic, social and emotional development; where relevant, their medical history and the views of a medical professional; whether they have previously been educated out of their normal age group; and whether they may naturally have fallen into a lower age group if it were not for being born prematurely.

Where a parent's request for their child to be admitted out of their normal age group has been agreed to and, as a consequence of that decision, the child will be admitted to a relevant age group (i.e. the age group to which pupils are normally admitted to the school) the application will be processed as part of the main admissions round, unless the parental request is made too late for this to be possible, and on the basis of their determined admission arrangements only, including the application of oversubscription criteria where applicable. The application **will not be** given lower priority on the basis that the child is being admitted out of their normal age group. Parents have a statutory right to appeal against the refusal of a place at a school for which they have applied.

In Year/Midyear/Non Routine/Casual Admissions

Admissions are the responsibility of the Governing Body.

All parents requesting a school place, either because they are new to Lancashire or because they are wishing to transfer schools within Lancashire during the school year will be required to complete the relevant School Application Form.

In-year admission is the process of applying for a school place during the school year. Any applications for the intake made after the start of the autumn term will be treated as an in-year application.

The in-year admission process is managed by the school. Parents are required to complete the in-year application form, which is available from the school website. Where a place cannot be secured, parents will be offered a legal right of appeal to an independent appeal panel.

Lancashire County Council administers the appeals process on behalf of the school. Parents can complete the school's [appeal form](#) on Lancashire County Council's website.

Parents who wish their application to this Catholic school to be considered against the priority faith criteria should also complete the Supplementary Information Form and return it directly to the school. If the school is oversubscribed with mid year applications at the time of requested admission, failure to complete the Supplementary Information Form may result in your application for a place in this school being considered against lower priority criteria.

Parents can request that the date their child, if below compulsory school age, is admitted to school is deferred to later in the school year or attendance is part time until the term when they reach compulsory school age.

Summer born children

The term summer born children relates to all children born from 1 April to 31 August. These children reach compulsory school age on 31 August following their fifth birthday (or on their fifth birthday if it falls on 31 August). It is likely that most requests for summer born children to be admitted out of their normal age group will come from parents of children born in the later summer months or those born prematurely.

REVIEW

This Policy will be reviewed annually with the Admissions Authority in the light of any changed circumstances in our school or the local area.
