



STARTING AT SAWLEY

SAWLEY TO BOLTON-BY-BOWLAND

Walk 5.1

The stile beyond the river bridge at Sawley somehow invites exploration of the countryside beyond, and this walk to Bolton-by-Bowland does just that. It is hardly a riverside walk but a walk through highly scenic parkland. After a stroll through the village the walk returns by a different route but involves fording Skirden Beck, not easy except in dry weather, though there is an acceptable alternative.

Category:

Time: about 21/2 hours plus time spent in the village

Distance: 6 miles, 71/2 if you divert from the ford


Map: Pathfinder Series No.669 Chipping and Clitheroe (SD64/74)
Start at: Sawley. There is room to park three or four series of the

Sawley. There is room to park three or four cars off the road on the

north side of the Ribble bridge. Alternatively roadside parking is

possible near the Spread Eagle and the Abbey ruins.

Go past the hotel and over the river bridge where you will find a little gate into the field on the right - and a notice instructing you to keep away from the river banks and follow the hedge. A later one instructs you to follow the white stones. It gives the feeling that you are not 144



right-hand corner to find the stile, then continue down the field to a short length of wall near the right-hand corner to find the next stile, and then follow the line of trees to the corner to find the stile onto the road. Turn left and follow the road right through the village to the bridge over Skirden Beck. Turn to Walk 5.1 to read something about this tranquil and attractive village.

As soon as you have crossed the bridge turn left onto a farm access road. Keep straight ahead in the corner where the road swings left and follow the fence to find the next stile then slant across the top of the wood and follow that steeply down to a stile where you turn right to find a good footbridge over Holden Beck. Turn left and after the first stile cross a long field to its right-hand corner and shortly reach the banks of the Ribble, if briefly. Now you follow a line of white splashed stones then trees to reach the stile by the road bridge.

Sawley Abbey

Whilst you are at Sawley you may care to have a look at the ruins of Sawley Abbey, sometimes known as Salley Abbey. At first sight there is little left above ground through extensive foundations have been excavated. The abbey was never wealthy like its parent house, for its lands were poor, and the climate harsh. This is reflected in the quality of the stonework, for there is very little ashlar masonry and large parts are simply built of rough stone blocks, some of it of the easily weathered Worston Shales, the cause of the gaunt appearance of the remains. It is still worth a look, however. It is maintained by English Heritage.

For the record, Sawley Abbey was founded in 1147, a daughter house of Fountains Abbey, not the nearby Whalley Abbey (which was founded in 1216, having been at Stanlow, Cheshire, before that date). Like other monastic houses it was dissolved in 1536 by Henry VIII and much of the better stone carted away to be used again, common practice in those days.

EASINGTON FELL FROM SAWLEY

Walk 5.3

The top of Easington Fell, 396m, can't be seen from Sawley, so it may never occur to you to climb it from there, yet it makes a better walk from Sawley than from Slaidburn. There is a good route through the fields, and right of way tracks take you to the last stile, within ^{1/4} mile of the summit cairn. Surely nobody is going to crib at that small 150

distance to reach such a fine view point, arguably the best in the Bowlands? The return is via Waddington and the Ribble though it can be shortened by 2 miles by descending direct to West Bradford.

Category: Just A if you use the right of way paths through the forest, B+ if you


Sawley to Scriddles Farm

Assuming you are parked on the north side of the bridge walk along the road to Grindleton for about 150 yards and turn right into the first lane on the right. It is signed the Friends Meeting House. At its end go through the gate and follow the little stream until you are just below the garden of Acreland, then cross it by a good footbridge and continue on the other side. Already there are pleasing views up the Ribble Valley. You will find whitewash splashes on the trees to keep you on the straight and narrow, but take care to go diagonally left from the first hedge corner to pick up the next splash and avoid the NO PATH sign staring you in the face if you do not. (The Sawley Estates at work again!) At least route finding is now easy. Simply follow these white splashes through three fields climbing quite steeply in parts and in the fourth one cut diagonally across to Till House. That's now the end of them. Pass to the left of the farm and go behind it to join their access road where you turn left and follow it through the buildings ahead. When you've passed a sharp left-hand corner by the next farm, look out for the stile in a wobbly fence opposite the last part of the house and continue straight up the field to the road at Scriddles Farm.

Now the view ahead and to the left is opening out. Pendle blocks all distant views to the south but westwards the lower Ribble Valley punctuated by the chimney of the Chatburn cement works opens out very pleasantly.

This Route Card is designed for use in conjunction with the following maps:

Pathfinder 669 (SD64/74) Clitheroe and Chipping Pathfinder 680 (SD63/73) Longridge and Great Harwood Pathfinder 660 (SD65/75) Slaidburn & The Forest of Bowland and Pathfinder 670 (SD84/94) Barnoldswick and Earby

A general direction of travel is given for each target, which can be reached by the use of Public Footpath, Permissive Path, Bridleway and short stretches of road.

The route may be completed in its entirity on one day or spread over as many days as suit individual walkers. A Certificate of Achievement is available from Clitheroe Information Centre upon completion of the route.

Detail of Pendle Big End to Wellsprings Public House:

From Big End walk due west for approximately 800 metres (about 10 minutes) to wall and visible path. Turn left at wall and walk SW then SSW, keeping Ogden Clough on your left for 2.3 km (about 30 minutes). When you reach obvious path, turn WSW over side of Black Hill (GR 787 398). Continue on good track SW to first footpath junction on map. Turn right to Well Springs Public House. (Pathfinder 670).

HIS is a walk through history, both medieval and modern, on a route that encompasses some of the loveliest scenes in Lancashire.

Directions: From the abbey entrance, walk past the Spread Eagle pub and turn left to cross the River Ribble. At the junction turn left, but almost immediately turn right on to the drive of the Friends Meeting House.

Keep ahead to reach the forecourt of a garage next to a wooden gate. Edge along the left side of the forecourt to reach a footpath on the left. This soon enters woodland, steadily climbing. After a stile, the path continues across pasture to drop to a footbridge across a stream before re-commencing the steady climb to Till House. Just before Till House, cross a stile into its garden, cross the lawn to the far side of the house and follow waymark signs to its drive, which leads past a farmhouse and then swings left between buildings. When the drive swings left again, keep ahead to a stile on top of a wall.

Keep ahead with a fence on the right. After the next stile, cross a depression in rough pasture to a stile on the skyline. Over this, and you commence the long descent to Holden. Initially, it crosses a field to pass between two gateposts, and then continues north-east, passing through two metal gates to enter a large pasture. On the far side, aim for an isolated-barn. Just beyond the barn, go through a small gate and continue a gentle descent to Holden.

When you reach the lane turn right and then at the junction left. After 50m, turn right to climb through a narrow gap in the high wall. With the hedge on the Simplemann Business Bolton Library Bourses Bolton Close Parts Control Bolton Close Parts Bourses Bo

left, pass through a gate on the left and continue with the hedge on the right. After the next stile the path enters water meadows – water that has to be crossed. After the stream continue up a low rise to make a surprising discovery – the site of a nuclear war civil defence bunker.

The way continues to a metal gate,

giving out onto a farm track. Turn left and follow the track as it passes to the left of a large farmhouse called Hungrill. Keep on the track as it passes behind Hungrill, and then 50m before it reaches pasture, go through a metal gate on the left. Broadly following the fence on the right, continue over an isolated stile to swing round to the farmstead of Green Ford. The footpath is well signed here, leading through the yard to a metal gate. Go through this and cross the next field to a lane. Turn right. After 300m, turn left through the yard of a defunct garden centre, and after crossing a stile join a riverside path to Bolton by Bowland. As you reach the road, turn left and continue past the green and church to a drive on the right. Passing between two impressive gateposts keep on the drive for 700m, before taking a track on the right. However, a short diversion is recommended here. Continue to King's House, where over a gate on the right King Henry's Well may be seen. After losing the battle of Hexham in 1464, Henry VI found refuge here. The well is linked in some way to that event. Back to the track (now on your left) follow it to a footbridge across Skirden Beck. The path then turns right, skirts a patch of woodland, and then bears left across meadows to reach a second footbridge. Go over this and bear left to cross two large fields, bringing you to the banks of the Ribble. Turn right and, after passing through a plantation of young trees, follow the river back to Sawley.
