1. The first step in the process of identifying a problem is to define the problem clearly. This involves identifying the symptoms and the consequences of the problem.

(d) The fourth step in the process of identifying a problem is to identify the resources that are available to address the problem. This involves identifying the skills, knowledge, and assets that can be used to solve the problem.

(f) The sixth step in the process of identifying a problem is to identify the potential solutions that could address the problem. This involves brainstorming ideas and evaluating the feasibility of each solution.

(g) The seventh step in the process of identifying a problem is to identify the most appropriate solution for the problem. This involves comparing the potential solutions and selecting the one that best addresses the problem.

(h) The eighth step in the process of identifying a problem is to implement the chosen solution. This involves putting the solution into action and monitoring its progress.

(i) The ninth step in the process of identifying a problem is to evaluate the effectiveness of the solution. This involves assessing the impact of the solution and determining whether it has successfully addressed the problem.

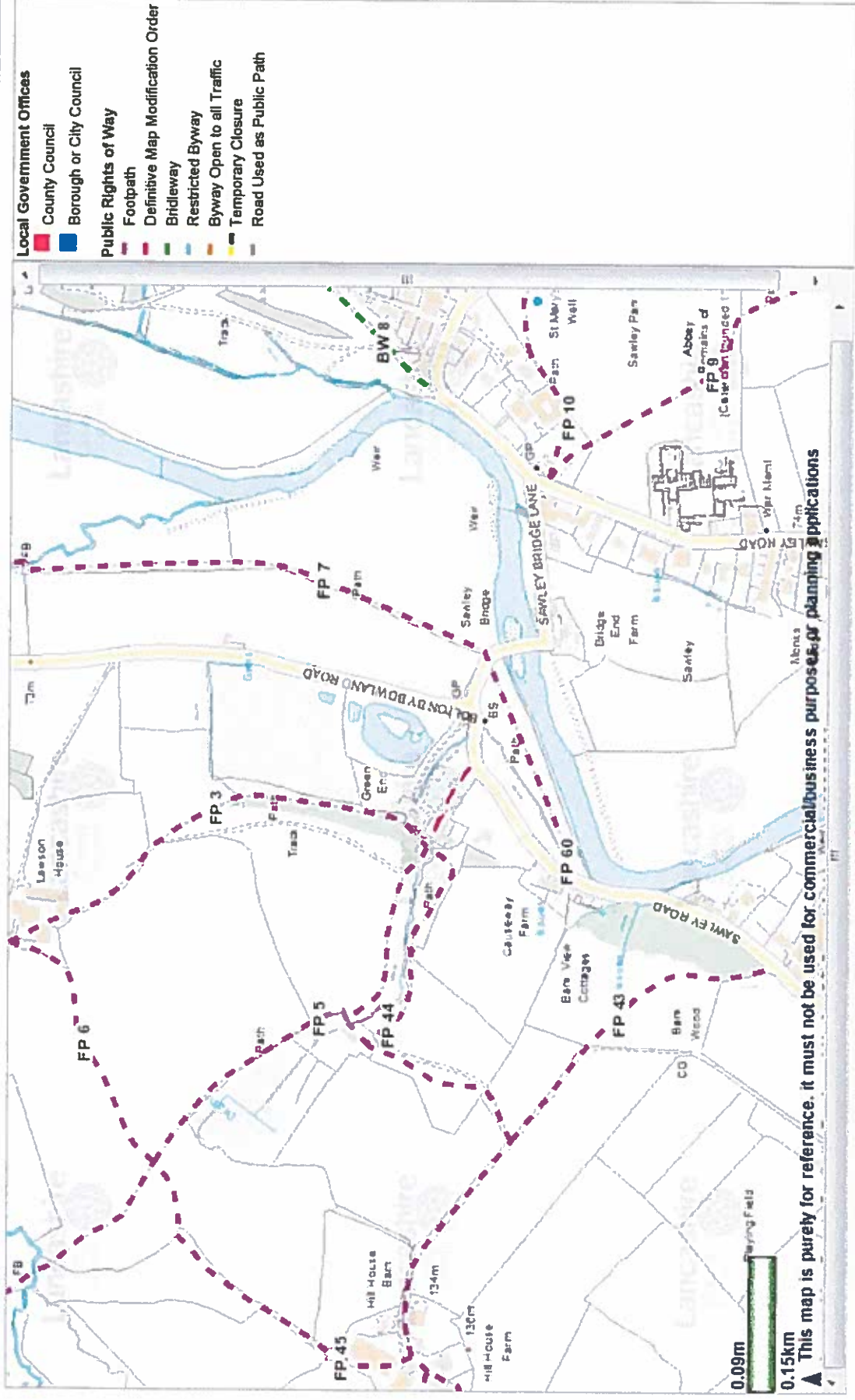
