

How Martyn's Law will affect education settings

Martyn's Law has now come into effect within education settings. The law pays tribute to Martyn Hett, one of 21 people tragically killed in the 2017 Manchester Arena attack. The **Department for Education** have worked in conjunction with the Home Office on how the legislation will apply to the education sector. Martyn's Law is intended **to improve protective security and organisational preparedness across the UK**, as it introduces a tiered framework, categorising premises and events based on the number of individuals to be present at any one

time. It will require those responsible to take steps to **mitigate the impact of a terrorist attack** and **reduce harm** in the event of an attack occurring - this includes all education settings.

The <u>Terrorism (Protection of Premises) Act 2025</u>, also known as Martyn's Law became law 3 April 2025.

The Government has published the below guidance for education settings, to provide information on how education settings, **including early years settings**, will be affected when this law is implemented.

Recording choking incidents



The EYFS 2025 includes detailed guidance that must be followed to ensure the safety of children while they are eating. This includes advice to reduce the risk of children choking. A choking incident includes any incident where a child coughs or splutters/struggles to breathe when eating or putting anything in their mouth right up to fully blocked airways and death.

When a choking incident occurs providers should record details of where and how the child choked. These records should be reviewed periodically to identify trends or common features of incidents that can be addressed to reduce the risk of choking and more serious incidents occurring. Providers

must have ongoing discussions with parents/carers about the stage their child is at in regard to introducing solid foods. Assumptions must not be based on age. Remember - Think stage not age.

A child dies in the UK every month from choking and hundreds more require hospital treatment. Kent Safeguarding Partnership developed the EatSafe Campaign following an incident in one of their nurseries where a little boy choked and sadly died while eating pasta. The campaign has been designed to support early years providers to ensure safeguarding at mealtimes and to reduce the risk of serious harm to children whilst eating. As the campaign is led by Kent Local Authority settings in Lancashire will be unable to access the free course but the really helpful EatSafe resources are available to all EatSafe - Kent Safeguarding Children

Road safety week 16th to 22nd November 2025

Road safety week is an annual campaign organised by the charity Brake, aimed at promoting road safety awareness and reducing traffic related injuries and fatalities.

Every year, more than 1700 people die on UK roads. Another 30,000 receive serious, lifechanging injuries. The numbers are shocking and there has been no significant reduction for more than a decade. This year the focus will be on vehicle safety. Safe vehicles are designed to prevent road crashes and protect people inside and outside the vehicle if a crash does happen. Safe vehicles...

- **Prevent crashes** automated driver assistance systems keep vehicles in the right lane and below speed limits, detect hazards and brake in an emergency.
- **Protect people inside and outside the vehicle** seatbelts, airbags and 'forgiving' vehicle parts protect people inside and outside the vehicle in a crash. Vehicles must pass stringent crash tests.
- Manage driver safety vehicle technology detects unsafe driving behaviour (eg. Due to tiredness) and informs authorities.
- Are roadworthy vehicles are maintained to the highest standards and drivers carry out checks before every journey.
- **Record crashes** event data recorders record what happens in a crash and notify emergency services immediately.

Safe vehicles are an important part of the safe systems approach to road safety – a shared approach to prevent death and serious injury from road crashes.
