

NOTICE OF MAKING
ROAD TRAFFIC REGULATION ACT 1984
LANCASHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL
(VARIOUS LOCATIONS, HYNDBURN, PRESTON AND SOUTH RIBBLE) (PROHIBITION OF
RIGHT TURN, PROHIBITION OF DRIVING AND 7.5 TONNE WEIGHT RESTRICTION) ORDER
2026

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on 27th April 2026 Lancashire County Council made the above Traffic Regulation Order under Sections 1, 2, 4 and 92 to the **Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984**, as amended, the effect of which will be to:

1. Introduce a prohibition of right turn in the following lengths of road:
 - a) Lowthorpe Road, Preston, northbound vehicles on Lowthorpe Road to be prohibited from turning right into Blackpool Road;
 - b) Romford Road, Preston, northbound vehicles on Romford Road to be prohibited from turning right into Blackpool Road.
2. Introduce a prohibition of driving in Pickup Street, Accrington, from a point 2 metres south of its junction with Charter Street for a distance of 1 metre in a southerly direction for the entire width of the carriageway.
This prohibition includes an obstruction in accordance with Section 92 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984.
3. Introduce a 7.5 tonne weight restriction on Flag Lane, Penwortham, from a point 49.5 metres from its junction with the centreline of Werneth Close for a distance of 90 metres in a south westerly direction.

This Order will come into force on the 11th May 2026.
